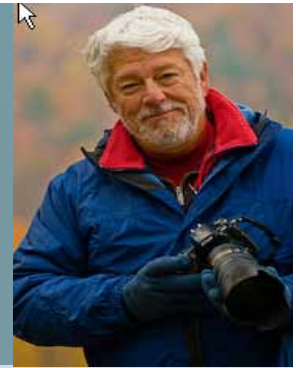

And because they had both taught photography, given seminars, and lectures to professional photo and designer groups, they morphed Margo's original Barefoot Contessa Adventures into Barefoot Contessa Photo Adventures. Currently, they run ten regularly-scheduled photo workshops with a maximum ratio of 6:1 students to instructors as well as private workshops for individuals, families, and small groups.
